As Women's Month is celebrated across the country, the ANC Women's League (ANCWL) in eThekwini is using the moment not only to reflect, but to reaffirm the urgency of placing women at the centre of political, economic, and social transformation. In a written contribution, eThekwini Regional Secretary of the ANCWL, Comrade Mpume Mabaso, stresses that the commemoration must go beyond slogans and symbolism.

"We cannot romanticise the month of August while millions of women remain trapped in cycles of poverty, unemployment and violence," Mabaso says. "This month must sharpen our resolve to demand structural change — not token gestures."

In eThekwini, the retrenchment of thousands of Expanded Public Works Programme workers — most of them women — has deepened the crisis. Women remain excluded from land, formal employment, and economic opportunities, while carrying the daily burden of sustaining households amid collapsing clinics, rising youth drug abuse, and the absence of affordable childcare.

This year's commemorations also honour the late Comrade Lungile Gcabashe, former Deputy President of the ANCWL, remembered as a revolutionary who embodied the spirit of Charlotte Maxeke, Lillian Ngoyi, and Winnie Madikizela-Mandela. "Comrade Lungile taught us that women don't need permission to lead — they must lead because history demands it," Mabaso recalls.

From fighting gender-based violence to leading grassroots campaigns, the ANCWL in eThekwini stands firm: there can be no national democratic revolution without women's full emancipation. In honour of Comrade Lungile and countless unsung heroines, the message is clear — the future must be built by women, not around them.



- On 09 August 1956, brave women marched at the height of apartheid, risking their lives to stand up for justice.
- The march was against pass laws that targeted and restricted women.
- Twenty thousand women gathered at the Union Buildings in Pretoria to deliver a memorandum protesting the tyranny of the apartheid government.

# IN THE LOOP

### Selected Takeaway's From The NEC Statement

- The ANC reaffirms its commitment to addressing the triple oppression of women in terms of race, class, and gender.
- The ANC issues a clarion call to confront persisting gender inequalities, including **GBV and femicide**.
- At the Liberation Movements Summit, the ANC reaffirmed its commitment to building a better Africa and a better world.
- The ANC rejects attempts by domestic and foreign forces to destabilise the nation through misinformation and economic coercion.

#### Government

- The ANC condemns the DA's calls to abandon BBBEE as an affront to the Freedom Charter principles.
- Stabilising Eskom with a 70% EAF shows determination to end load shedding and ensure energy security.
- Preparations for the National Dialogue are proceeding as planned.
- The NEC reminds structures that the GNU is temporary and necessary to safeguard the progressive agenda amidst a fractured mandate.
- The NEC resolved to reset the GNU and broaden participation through engagement with current partners.

#### **Organizational**

- All branches must comply with functionality criteria and complete the Foundation Course by November 2025.
- Branch General Meetings must be quality-assured and attendance strictly verified
- Regional Executive Committees must adopt performance-based KPIs.
- •Conferences must be concluded by December 2025 ahead of Local Government Elections.
- •The membership cut-off date for the NGC will be 30 September 2025.
- •The National General Council will be held from 8–12 December 2025 at NASREC.
- •The 2026 January 8th Rally will be hosted in the North West Province.

## REBUILDING OUR ORGANIZATIONAL MACHINERY

The PTT has made it clear: rebuilding branches is the foremost priority. Weak branches mean a weak movement. Task Teams will be appointed urgently at branch and zonal levels to:

- Verify and clean outdated membership data
- Recruit new members and renew existing ones
- Appoint Branch Portal Administrators for effective admin access
- Reactivate ANC's presence and activism at local levels.

# DEMARCATION & BY-ELECTION READINESS

The region has finalized its submission to the Municipal Demarcation Board, which led to the creation of Ward 112 and the retention of Cato Ridge under eThekwini. A regional workshop will soon be held to ensure branches fully understand the demarcation implications.

We are also fully behind the Ward 64 byelection. Registration took place on 2-3 August, and the election will be held on 17 September. RTT members have been deployed full-time to support the campaign.

# ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT & GOVERNANCE

The rollout of the OR Tambo School's foundation courses will resume once the branch and zonal task teams are in place. Additionally, a new councillor reporting template has been introduced, ensuring monthly accountability on service delivery, branch work, and community engagement.
